March's' Meeting Program:

Presiding over the meeting was Roger Staab. Roger reported that UP took the rotary snow plows up the mountain in March to blow some snow. This is the first time in many years that they have been taken out of the Roseville Yards to go up on the hill. Evidently there are not many operators left who know how to run and maintain the rotaries, so they needed to train some new staff. Our own Brendan Compton was able to go along and film them in action. We are all looking forward to seeing some of the video.

Member Phil Sexton presented a very interesting talk with slides titled the "Short Life of a Short Line; the History of the Boca and Loyalton Logging Railroad".

Phil has spent considerable time researching the history of this railroad. Using old newspaper articles, notes and letters, plus topographical maps and satellite photographs he has found considerable evidence of the old right-of-way and important points along the route.

Around 1900 the town of Loyalton experienced a boom time for about 20 years by providing lumber for the building of the railroads. The railroad was the mainstay of the region, and the town depended on it to get supplies, ship livestock, and transport the trees to the mills and to move the lumber out for the building of railroads throughout the West. Phil's slides showed the old grade, still clearly visible from satellite photos. Thank you Phil for this informative presentation about railroad history in our region.
