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January Program

Lyle Brown brought the "California's Gold" video on ice harvesting at the Boca Reservoir and some Donner Pass history. The harvesting of ice from the lake made possible the shipping ice to Sacramento and San Francisco, and later for shipping of refrigerated California produce by railroad cars throughout the United States.

Depending on the thickness of ice available, from 50 -200 men were employed during the cold winter months to harvest and store up to 300,000 tons of ice. Lake ice was anywhere from 12 - 22 inches thick, depending on the weather and winter temperature. Without this ice, the development of California produce farms, along with the Pacific Fruit Express refrigerated cars, shipping fruit to east to Chicago, New York, etc would not have been possible.

The video also featured the history of the Sierra snow sheds, which were built to protect the tracks during winter months.

The second feature of the evening was a photographic railroad history of Applegate presented by Peter Hills. Included were some never before seen photos of east and west Applegate stations provided by some of the local longtime Applegate residents' collections.

Board Member Meeting


