Stewardship of Colfax Caboose: agreed to send a letter to the City of Colfax proposing that PSRHS assume responsibility for and control of the Colfax caboose.

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From the Archives

November Photo and Mystery: This month's photo is part of an ongoing mystery. Towle Brothers operated 5 narrow gauge engines on Texas Hill near Emigrant Gap until selling to Read Lumber in 1902. Read operated there until 1920 when they sold the operations to Lake Valley Lumber. The 5 narrow gauge engines were listed in the 1920 sale documents. The photo at right was taken in 1937 by Al Phelps, and labeled Read Lumber Co. No. 2, taken at Burnetts Mill on Texas Hill. The photo below it shows Towle Bros. Porter locomotive No. 2. Note similarities in boiler shape, bell bracket, piping near top of boiler, and platforms on each side.

Fast forward to persistent rumors that an engine was left in the woods, and has been spotted by several people over the years. Could this Al Phelps photo be the basis of the rumors, and is the engine boiler still out there?

Local trails expert Ron Gould, author of North Fork Trails, offered to lead a small group of us to to a boiler he had found in one of the canyons near Texas Hill. We made the trek on Oct. 31, and found a boiler, but not of the same size and shape as a narrow gauge engine. Photos of the longer boiler found near a stream bed are shown below. It appears to be a stationary boiler, but its use and history are not known. An ensuing but brief exploration around the Burnett Mill site failed to turn up other evidence of the engine featured in the Al Phelps photo.

On our trek we did find portions of the old grades for both the steam wagon road and the old narrow gauge roadbed from Fulda Flat to Texas Hill. Photos of the visit and the roadbeds and artifacts we found will be the subject of a future PSRHS member meeting.

Meanwhile the mystery deepens.

CPRR/SP Donner Route Timeline: In his Chief Engineer's report in 1877, Montague reported "The most important permanent improvements made upon your road during the year 1876 have been the filling of all the high trestles remaining on the Sacramento division" including trestles at Newcastle, Auburn, Lovell's Mill, Clipper Gap, Long Ravine, and Secret Town. He further stated "This completes the work of this kind on the mountain division" except for possible replacement of the Howe Truss bridge at Long Ravine with an embankment, but the bridge should not need renewal for 12-15 years.
