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# PSRHS Monthly Meeting 7PM Thursday, Jan. 23rd, Auburn Airport Meeting Room

January Program: Scott Inman will give us a status update on the new 35,000 square foot Southern Pacific Railroad History Center to be constructed on the site of the original historic Central Pacific Railroad rail yards in Rocklin. The new museum will include the Southern Pacific archives and library, displays of Southern Pacific artifacts, a gift shop, and a massive railroad model of the SP line from San Francisco, over Donner Pass, to Ogden Utah. The archives will represent the most significant and comprehensive publicly accessible collection of SPRR data and documents. Outside in front of the museum will be a display of SP equipment, including an original SP RDC Railcar.

Scott Inman is President of the History Center and a well-known author and historian. The History Center will be an excellent resource for PSRHS's mission of preserving railroad history on SP's Donner Pass Route.

November Program Recap: PSRHS member Peter Hills presented Norway - Trains, Planes, Ships and Snow. Peter included information and views of numerous train rides, museum visits, a coastal voyage to points above the Arctic Circle, and lots of snow. Peter's inclusion of some history and facts regarding Norway rounded out this interesting program.

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#### Passing Scene - Canyon Creek Crossing

When the Central Pacific tracks were constructed above Alta in 1866, a stone-arch culvert and fill were needed to cross Canyon Creek (see Hart photo on page 4). In 1916 the line was double-tracked by Southern Pacific, requiring a much wider fill to support the wider 2-track roadbed. This in turn required a much longer culvert under the expanded fill. The original stone-arch culvert was left in place, but it was lengthened at both ends with concrete extensions. The photo below was taken where Casa Loma Road crosses Canyon Creek just downstream from the railroad culvert and fill. The railroad bed is the straight line near the top of the photo. The guardrail in the foreground marks the edge of Casa Loma Road, just east of the Alta exit on I-80. *Photo by Roger Staab*




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#### From the Archives

November Mystery Photo (right): Just east of Alta the new Central Pacific tracks crossed Canyon Creek. This view shows the stone-arch culvert and fill under construction to support the tracks as they crossed the stream. The culvert was 185 feet long with an opening width of 12 feet. Accidents/Other Incidents. From the Sacramento Bee, 18 Jun 1918: "Carload of Wine is Telescoped; Hoboes Enjoy 'Can Party' – Tempting California Wines Destined for French Soldiery Fall to Lot of 'Weary Willies" at Colfax. Colfax (Placer County), June 18 ... The streams and ditches on the Southern Pacific right-of-way, at the east end of Colfax, ran parti-colored with port, claret, sherry, zinfandel, muscat, angelica, burgundy and about all the other kinds of wine produced in the State of California. Car Turns Turtle In switching in the yards near the Colfax abbatoir, a car laden with wine was telescoped. About one-third of the barrels in the car were bursted [sic] and the wine ran out in a stream. The place where the accident occurred is the rendezvous for all the hoboes who pass through this city, and there was a goodly number of the Weary Willies in camp at the time. Hoboes Hold Orgie As soon as they realized what had happened every available tin can in the camp was pressed into service and an orgie [sic] ensued. Wine was as free as the air and the gentleman of the wanderlust literally took baths in it. ... Thrifty residents of the vicinity took the juice by the gallon for future use. The wine was destined for France."
