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

#### <u>MARCH PSRHS MEETING</u> <u>Tuesday, March 22, 7PM,</u> <u>Auburn Veterans Memorial Hall</u>

**Program:** Kevin Knauss will discuss Amos Catlin, Theodore Judah, and the Sacramento Area's Early Railroads. Amos Catlin was Theodore Judah's Attorney and close friend. Catlin was involved in several of Judah's early railroad efforts, including the Sacramento Valley Railroad, American River Railroad, and the California Central Railroad. After Judah's death in November of 1863, Catlin assisted Anna Judah with her legal affairs.

Kevin Knauss is a local historian who focuses on the historical events of the Gold Rush along the American River and development of the region from Sacramento to Auburn. His research has led to publishing books on water canals under Folsom Lake and biographies of Benjamin N. Bugbey and Amos P. Catlin.

**February Program Recap:** Chuck Spinks and Roger Staab presented **PSRHS – Where We've Been and What We Are,** honoring the club reaching its 20th year as a non-profit dedicated to preserving the rail history of the Donner Route. A slide show featuring past field trips highlighted where we've been, while a look at our web site's features addressed what we are today.

#### TONGUE IN CHEEK RAILROAD HUMOR


In the 1920's and '30's Colfax was home to numerous Tuberculosis treatment centers or sanatoriums. Some of the patients published a monthly magazine called The Tea Bee that included information on treatment along with tidbits about and for the patients. Southern Pacific's tracks were not far from many of these Sans. This bit of humor appeared in the Jan. 1925 Tea Bee.

"After three engines had slipped through Colfax unheard in the dead of night during the last two months, the hospital patients took up a collection to buy louder whistles for the S.P. The division superintendent was very apologetic and craved their indulgence in that it was clearly a breach of orders as he, personally, had instructed all engineers to blow their whistles as often and as loud as possible while passing through Colfax. – "Uncle Henry"

#### Passing Scene – UP 1943 – The Spirit – Honoring US Armed Forces

This excellent photo of UP 1943, The Spirit, was captured by Bill Yoder from our Applegate web-cam on February 26, 2022. This locomotive was featured in our April 2018 newsletter, then leading the UP business train westbound near Tunnel 16.

Per the Union Pacific web site – "Union Pacific's Locomotive No. 1943, The Spirit, was the company's 16th commemorative locomotive. The Spirit honors the United States' armed forces and the men and women filling their ranks... Every detail in The Spirit's trade dress incorporates a piece of each U.S. armed forces branch. The Spirit's front is symbolic of Air Force Silver, and the blue stripe is a reflection of the former Strategic Air Command's "nose sash." The lettering inside the sash is the original handdrawn font used on the B-17 *(also Christened the Spirit of Union Pacific in 1943)*. It is followed by the Coast Guard's "Racing Stripe" and the Navy's Battleship Gray, which frames Union Pacific's traditional American flag. The military camouflage is a nod to the Army and Marines. As the train passes by, the final message on the tail is dedicated to U.S. prisoners of war and those missing in action, featuring the POW/MIA symbol and its motto, You Are Not Forgotten."





#### From the Archives

**February Mystery Photo (right):** Southern Pacific's San Francisco Overland #28, one of its premier passenger trains, is departing Colfax eastbound circa 1950. The primary power is two new diesels, with a cab-forward in helper service for the grades ahead. Cab-forwards used to provide primary power for SP passenger and freight trains over Donner. Accidents/Other Incidents. Auburn Journal, 12 Sept. 1912 – Railroad Ties Burned by Runaway Freight Train – "Some remarkable facts regarding a runaway Southern Pacific gravel train from Auburn, which did no harm save the setting of several ties afire, delayed no trains, but broke speed records for speed through the lower end of Placer County were brought out at the hearing ... The hearing showed that the accident was caused by the fact that the cars were too heavily loaded and brakeage (*sic*) was not sufficient to hold the train when it reached the 2.7 percent grade just above Newcastle. The train started its terrific sprint in the Newcastle tunnel, and although the members of the crew realized they might soon face death, not one attempted to jump... the train reached a speed of sixty-five miles an hour ... the forty seven cars swayed and rocked around the curves and the locomotive ran a part of the time on the wheels of one side. While engineer Young remained at his post in the locomotive and kept the air brakes set, brakeman and fireman crept along the train in the dust and confusion and set thirty-five hand brakes before the train was stopped."
